C25.85 PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

(i) Public Question Time – General

The Director of S.E.N.S.E spoke in support of agenda item C25.88 SKATEPARK.

S.E.N.S.E. Community Interest Company, under the name of the Pulse Point, requests permission in principle to develop a proposal and investigate funding sources for a community led redevelopment of the current skatepark facility owned by the Town Council.

A Member stated that while redevelopment of the area would be a good idea, to decide he would require further information on the plan and asked if the proposal would be using the same concrete footprint that is currently there.

The representative stated that she was seeking permission in principle to then develop the plan and that the intent is to stay within the same footprint of the current facility.

A Member asked if she intended to include a covered area in the plan.

The representative stated that the redevelopment would be staged with the first stage being to re-position the current equipment to a more concentrated, central position with the addition of a Pump Track around the perimeter. A second stage could include a covered area with solar panels on the roof to provide power to the area which could be used for lighting, security cameras and music.

A Member asked what other funding had been explored.

The representative stated that if the project can be given permission, then further funding could be sought. An expression of interest has been submitted to the Malvern Hills District Council Legacy Fund, due to the deadline for applications. In addition, Worcestershire County Council, Cllr. Bowen has pledged £1,000 to provide marketing materials to assist in canvassing the community for support.

Report for Tenbury Division Parish Councils July 2025

Worcestershire County Council Matters

The first Cabinet Meeting of the new administration was held on 26th June. As the first Cabinet Meeting, the only matter before it was to sign off on the County Council accounts for year ending April 24/25, which was the final year of the previous Council.

The accounts confirm that the overall debt amounts to £604 million, which is due to a combination of insufficient national government funding and spending choices made by the previous County Council administration. This means that Worcestershire will continue to experience significant financial pressures for the foreseeable future.

Work is continuing on developing a Local Government Reorganisation proposal to be presented to national government in November. A seminar is being held later this month for all County Councillors, which will set out in more detail the options being considered. As previously circulated, these are the options of a unitary council (One Worcestershire), or a "two council" option of North Worcestershire and South Worcestershire. Financially, the analysis by the consultants PWC has indicated that the greater benefits come from the One Worcestershire option, although work is continuing on this. In respect of the North / South option, I understand that the Tenbury Division would come under South Worcestershire along with the rest of the Malvern Hills District Council area.

Tenbury Division Matters

There are two main issues affecting Tenbury and the villages in our area.

The first is flooding. The Environment Agency has acknowledged that the settlement defence project for Tenbury will not be going ahead due to lack of funding. This is obviously disappointing, although not unexpected. It does give however give clarity.

My new Council Cabinet colleague, Ian Cresswell, is the Cabinet Member with Responsibility for Environment and Infrastructure and also the divisional councillor for Stourport Mitton, so knows Tenbury Division well. I am therefore working alongside him, the Environment Agency, and experts in the field to explore other options that might be available to provide a package of flood prevention, protection and resilience, including drainage, attenuation and diversion. The Environment Agency's Individual Flood Resilience Scheme for flood affected properties in Tenbury is also on-going.

The other significant issue in the area, particularly for the villages, is speeding traffic. As you'll be aware, there are usually criteria that have to be met for roads to get traffic calming measures, and work has previously done to increase Mobile Speed Camera activity, as well some provision of Vehicle Activated Signs. What hasn't necessarily been given the prominence that is should have in the past is the impact of speeding traffic on

the quality of life in our villages. I am therefore working with West Mercia Police and Worcestershire County Council Highways to change this. Another new Council Cabinet colleague, Karl Perks, is the Cabinet Member with Responsibility for Highways and Transport and the divisional councillor for Stourport Areley Kings and Riverside. So, he also knows our area well and understands the issues faced, and I am hopeful of positive support in trying to improve road safety in the division.

Having Cabinet Members with key responsibilities who understand the needs of our area is, I hope, going to benefit the division as a whole. I look forward to reporting in the months to come some of the improvements that this new approach to Tenbury and the villages will bring.

Local Government Reorganisation Engagement Exercise

The four-week public engagement exercise closed on 29 June 2025. Feedback will be used to help decide which of the two options to develop and put to the Government. Final plans need to be submitted by 28 November 2025.

Malvern Hills Rural Fund

Businesses, organisations and charities in the Malvern Hills had the opportunity to submit an Expression of Interest by midday on 7th July for Round Two of the Malvern Hills Rural Fund.

This funding opportunity is designed to support rural businesses and organisations with projects that address issues and overcome barriers to growth. Funding is available for capital projects, such as purchasing new equipment or machinery, with grants ranging from £2,500 - £25,000. Applicants must provide at least 50% match funding and all projects completed by 31st January 2026.

The deadline for full applications for round one closed midday, 16th June 2025. All submitted applications will be reviewed by the Malvern Hills Rural Funding team and presented to the Funding Panel in July.

UK Shared Prosperity Fund – Cultural/Heritage Attractions

The Council has supported various capital projects across a variety of attractions via the UKSPF grant programme.

The fund has supported local cultural and heritage assets, including Malvern Museum, The Regal Tenbury, Coach House Theatre, The Theatre of Small Convenience, The Round Market and Tudor House Museum (updating the Upton Heritage Trail information boards).

The Regal received funding towards a new projector and screen.

Visit the Malverns

Earlier in the year, MHDC Visitor Economy and Towns Manager organised a press visit for a journalist writing a feature for The Telegraph – 'The underrated region of the Midlands with 'one of the godliest vistas in England' article published on 4th June 2025.

In June, Visit the Malverns had a 13% increase on website visits compared to June 2024. Please see attached report for further information.

Community Recognition Scheme

Local heroes from across the district were recently praised and celebrated at a special community event. The event, which recognised individual and team achievements within local communities, was held at Hanley Swan Village Hall on Friday 6th June, during National Volunteer Week.

A total of 45 nominations were received for the scheme and six of those individuals were celebrated for their lifetime achievement and commitment to supporting their communities, contributing over 200 years of voluntary service between them.

The nominations were diverse, including volunteer drivers, supporting neighbours, village hall committees, trustees and community litter pickers, showing the range of ways people can have a positive impact on their local communities and make a real difference.

Bike Safety Workshop

A free Bike Safety workshop was held recently at Tesco Marketspace in partnership with Spike Bikes. The workshops are provided to help people get their bikes ready for safe and happy cycling.

West Midlands Awards for Planning Excellence

On the 27th June the Joint Planning Service (Wychavon District and Malvern Hills District Councils) was awarded the Royal Town Planning Institute's West Midlands Local Planning Authority of the Year award for 2025.



The scene from my window at Great Malvern's Mount Pleasant Hotel is achingly English. Looking toward the Severn Valley, I watch the afternoon sun flare across languid green fields, while in the foreground a medieval parish church stands proudly as dense grey rain clouds hover ominously nearby.

The 17th-century diarist John Evelyn called the view from the 1,394ft-high summit of the Malvern Hills "one of the godliest vistas in England", and it's hard to argue. Often mist-strewn, and straddling the counties of Worcestershire and Herefordshire (plus a fragment of northern Gloucestershire), the hills are an eight-mile-long ridge running north to south with the hillside town of Great Malvern acting as its quaint and curious epicentre.




The Victorians flocked to this corner of the Midlands in their droves, convinced the newfangled "water cure" would solve all their problems. Or they'd get a rare hot bath out of it, at any rate. Charles Dickens loved visiting this salubrious spot, and 100 years later, during the 1950s, another British literary titan was just as enamoured. Though for JRR Tolkien, it was the landscape that profoundly affected him and he loved taking walks in the Malvern Hills.

Flood Defences, Tenbury Wells

I note that our MP continues to prompt Government on the Tenbury FRMS. I have asked the Officer and Cabinet member responsible at our Lead Local Flood Authority, Worcestershire County Council (WCC), to visit to discuss flooding in general in our district and Tenbury in particular especially given the lack of post-flooding Section 19 reports (evaluating flooding events as a learning exercise, a statutory duty).

Local Government Reorganisation

PricewaterhouseCoopers (PwC), commissioned by WCC, advocate a whole Worcestershire Unitary. PwC have also been commissioned by the Integrated Care Boards (ICBs) on restructuring following their 50% cut to funding from March 2026; PwC recommend the present WCC + Herefordshire ICB be grouped with Coventry and Warwickshire ("with an eye to Local Government Reorganisation")

Neighbourhood Planning

Government has summarily withdrawn funding for neighbourhood planning.

MHDC Strategy, Post White Paper

The Malvern Hills District Council Legacy Grant Scheme bids, vetted by MHDC's senior officers will come forward for councillor comment later this week.
